Learning Links

How to support your child's learning at home



- Talk to your child about coming to Nursery and reassure them that you will always come back.
- Play games that require co-operation and turn taking, such as kicking a ball back and forth, hide and seek or snap.
- Show your child how to wash their hands using soap, supporting them to rub the soap all over and then wash it off. Encourage them to begin doing this independently.
- Encourage your child to use their cutlery independently at meal times.
- Share stories with your child. Encourage them to focus their attention on the book as you read with them.
- Sing together and repeat their favourite songs. Incorporate signs and actions to aid their language if possible.
- Promote mark making by letting your child explore pens/pencils and paper at home.
- If possible allow them to use items such as cameras, remote controls or tablets (with adult supervision).
- Play number games and sing number rhymes.
- Promote an interest in shapes by pointing out shapes in the environment.
- Listen to music together, clapping or tapping along to the beat.
- Create instruments from household items e.g. fill an empty drinks bottle with dried pasta, or use a saucepan as a drum.
