How to support your child's learning at home



- Give your child opportunities to make choices. Talk to your child about choices they have made.
- Help your child to understand simple boundaries and routines, e.g. its not safe to run inside, but we can in the garden. Encourage your child to understand routines, so plan their day, so they know what to expect next.
- Ensure your child has opportunities to join in.
- Encourage repetition, rhythm and rhyme by using tone and intonation as you tell, recite or sing stories, poems or rhymes from books .
- Use talk to describe what children are doing by providing a running commentary.
- Add words to what children say, e.g., child says "brush dolly hair", you say, "Yes, Lucy is brushing dolly's hair".
- Encourage your child to handle books, model how to hold a book correctly and show them how to turn the pages.
- Respond to how your child communicates need for food, drinks, toileting and when uncomfortable.
- Whilst sharing books with your child get them to repeat after you the familiar phrase.
- Provide simple sensory experiences, e.g., mark making in sand or other materials such as salt, shaving foam or paint.
- Sing lots of counting songs and rhymes so that your child hears number names correctly.
- Ask your child what their favourite songs are, sing and repeat them as often as you can .
