Physical Development

- To begin to use tools, i.e. pencils, scissors, etc, correctly and safely.
- To travel in a variety of ways..
- To move freely with pleasure and confidence.
- To learn to manage own toileting and hygienic needs.
- To begin to dress and undress for P.E..



Mathematical Development

- To join in with number rhymes and songs. For example, 10 green bottles, 5 little speckled frogs.
- To touch count 5 objects accurately and beyond.
- To recognise numbers in different places and make sets of objects.
- To explore and talk about 'flat' 2D shapes and find them in the environment. For example, a clock is a circle shape.



Literacy

- To recognise their name from a set of names.
- To learn to recognise, say and write sounds of the letters s,a,t,p,l,n,m,d,g,o, k.
- To copy some letters, i.e. letters from their name.
- To handle books with care.
- To attribute meaning to marks.
- To understand that writing is different from pictures.
- To talk about a story they have listened to.
- To sequence simple events in a story.



Communication and Language

- To listen to stories and to our friends in small groups.
- To focus our attention during carpet time.
- To respond to simple instructions.
- To begin to re-tell events in the correct order.

Understanding of the World

- To use simple technological toys such as CD player, camera and Interactive Whiteboard.
- To begin to talk about things that make them special.
- To recognise and describe friends and family.
- To talk about own likes and dislikes.
- RE Concept—Celebration: To learn about how Christians celebrate Harvest festival.



Expressive Arts & Design

- To make pictures using a variety of mark making equipment.
- To explore a variety of musical instruments.
- To use a variety of construction materials (i.e. Lego, Duplo, Sticklebricks).
- To use natural materials to create pictures. For example, making pictures using sticks.
- To sing some familiar songs.

<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Reading</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Try to read a story or colour banded book daily. In the early stages of reading, encourage children to look for any letters that they recognise and talk about the story using the pictures. <p> Spot some sounds! Write a Wow moment to tell us what sounds you spotted!</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Writing</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Help your child to read, recognise and write their name. Support your child to hold a pencil correctly using a tripod grip (with three fingers). Help your child to begin to write their name, using a capital letter and lower case letters. <p> Rainbow writing—Write your name in a creative way. Bring it in.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Maths</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Look for numbers in the environment Count things in everyday life, i.e. stairs, apples, busses, etc. Begin to understand and use the language of more and less <p> Number spotter! Write a Wow moment to tell us what numbers you spotted and where!</p>
<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Physical Development—Real PE</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> On the way to school or in the playground, try riding a pretend trike/bike in lots of different ways using your feet. Try standing on 1 leg and stare at your favourite teddy for 10 seconds - If you wobble they win/if you don't wobble you win! <p> Get active! Take a photo and send in a caption.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Health and Self-Care</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Support your child to dress and undress independently, ready for P.E. Practise putting on your coat and doing up your zip or buttons. <p> Quick Zip! How fast are you at putting on your coat? Come and show us!</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><u>Personal, Social and Emotional Development</u></p> <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Communication and Language</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Play a turn taking game. Look at a picture or a book cover together. Model speaking in full sentences as you talk about what you can see. For example, 'I can see a car.' <p> I spy! Draw a picture and write a sentence that your child says.</p>
