The children visited the Sea City Museum in Southampton where they role-played as passengers and crew members of the famous ship, had a guided tour around the museum learning some fascinating facts and also sharing what they have already learnt and conducted a science experiment of how they could keep the Titanic afloat by spreading the water into different compartments.

Finally to finish the Titanic Topic, the children were treated to The Open Box Theatre Company conducting workshops based on the Titanic.

The children travelled back in time to help build the ship, become first class passengers and also find the many theories as to who was to blame for the sinking of Titanic.




Year N Rainbow
