

Main Learning Question: Can I write fiction and non-fiction?

Learning Intent: Children will learn what non-fiction/fiction writing are and write sentences that form a short narrative real or fictional.

Implementation: Children will be taught the skills to be able to write information, reports, newspaper reports, sequence and retell a story, read pictures and answer questions, plan and write their own story. Children will be taught the skills to use their phonic knowledge to write.

Impact: Children will acquire the skills, knowledge and understanding to write information, reports, newspaper reports, sequence and retell a story, read pictures and answer questions, plan and write their own story and always applying their phonic knowledge to each task design.

Poetry is a type of literature, or artistic writing, that attempts to stir a reader's imagination or emotions whether through rhyme or not. Descriptions describe people, places, objects, or events using appropriate details. Details used are usually sensory and selected to describe what the writer sees, hears, smells, touches, and tastes. Descriptions are crucial for reading and writing development. The communication or expression of thoughts in spoken words, exchange of spoken words, conversation and something that is spoken need to be understood within composition and transcription.	Children can write sentences based on an observation. Children can apply their writing skills to create a report and poem. Children can use the suffix – er correctly. Children can write questions, description applying their writing skills correctly. Children can use and understand the purpose of an exclamation mark correctly to add impact to their writing. Children can understand spoken language. Children can apply their skills to a letter to inform.
