We are learning to:


- Continue a rhyming string.

Understanding the World.

We are learning to:

- Show curiosity and make observations when exploring a variety of objects.

Work with numbers to 10 to...

- Place them in order and say which number is 1 more and 1
- Find the total number of items in two groups by counting all of them
- Understand and begin to use comparative vocabulary such as heavier, lighter, more or less.

Reading

- Try to read a story or colour banded book daily. When reading, look for any letters/tricky words that your child has learned already. Encourage them to use the initial sounds and pictures to help decode the words
- Talk about the difference between letters and words. Can they count the words on the page?

Flash, crash! Read a rhyming story or Nursery Rhyme and identify the rhyming words.

Physical Development—Real PE

- Say a rhyme as you practise jumping.
- Lift up your feet and balance on your bottom like a cheeky monkey. Count as high as you can.

Get active! Take a photo / video and post it with a caption.

Writing

- Support your child to hold a pencil correctly using a tripod group (with three fingers).
- Talk about the sounds you can hear in words, i.e. c-a-t, cat, h-o-p, hop
- Practise writing tricky words (see the list on the classroom window or check the weekly memos on Tapestry)

Dear Santa... Cut out pictures from a catalogue or magazine. Can you label the pictures? This could be in the context of writing a Christmas wish list.

People and Communities

Discuss celebrations and traditions with your child that are important to your family.

Merry Christmas! Find out how Christmas is celebrated by another family you know or in a different country. Bring in what you find out.

Maths

- Stick numbers onto toys, i.e. cars, dolls. Can you child line them up in order?
- Talk about money using the language of pounds, pence, cost, amount, more, less. Compare 2 sets of pennies and say which one is more or less.

Shops—Use pennies to make sets to match amounts. Make 2 sets and count them altogether. Trace around the coins / write your numbers down to show us.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- Discuss with your child what makes them a superhero. What are they good at? How are they unique?
- Be a superhero! Make a poster by drawing pictures or labelling all the ways that you are a superhero.
